The Knowing-Doing Network (KDN) is a global, interconnected community focused on transforming education systems to ensure all children and young people develop the skills they need to thrive.

Coordinated by the Center for Universal Education (CUE) at Brookings, the KDN brings together researchers, policymakers, practitioners, funders, and educators from around the world to promote shared learning, joint research, and sustained collaboration to drive systemic change.

## **Our Purpose**

KDN members are working toward a world where all young people develop a range of cognitive, socioemotional, creative, and critical thinking skills to participate actively in the construction of a more just, peaceful, and sustainable world.

Achieving this requires rethinking the purpose of education and rebuilding systems to support this vision, focusing on both tangible factors like policies and resources and intangible aspects like power dynamics, norms, and mindsets.

Through collaborative efforts between education actors at both local and global levels, KDN aims to create lasting change in how education is delivered and experienced and the learning that comes from it.

Greater understanding and availability of evidence, resources, and supportive structures to implement effective, contextually relevant education policies and practices.



Increased collaboration among local and global actors to cocreate, fund, implement, and evaluate solutions that are evidence-based and responsive to local needs.

# **Our Approach**



### Expanding power, centering local priorities and building trust

Can a diverse group of committed education actors, dedicated to learning from and sharing with one another, truly influence how education systems foster skill development in children?

### Our network approach rests on three pillars:

### Connecting Actors

The KDN connects multiple networks of education actors focused on key elements of education systems such as gender equality, family engagement, pedagogical mindsets, and early childhood into a network of networks. This decentralized structure strengthens local and global partnerships across sectors and geographies, catalyzing collective learning and action.

### Centering Collaboration & Mutual Learning

The KDN creates spaces for collaborative, participatory research and strengthens its members through workshops, peer learning, and tools that enable networks to achieve greater collective impact. Members are encouraged to bring their diverse expertise, solutions, and strategies from their regions to support others across the network, fostering a collaborative ecosystem for transformative learning.

#### Shaping the Global Conversation

The KDN fosters continuous engagement through research, events, and webinars, enabling in-depth dialogue on complex educational challenges. By bringing local perspectives, especially from marginalized contexts, into global discussions, KDN members expand global actors' understanding of education challenges and potential solutions, informing transformative change at the local and global.
